The Special Education classrooms have been a busy place. Small group instruction takes place to help students close the gap between achievement and ability level. Interventions such as Reading Triumphs and Lively Letters, helps build skills in the area of reading, fluency and decoding. Students engage in activities to build skills in needed areas. We are working together to help students meet grade level goals. Progress reports are sent out quarterly to note student's progress and growth.

Communication between home and school helps students gain a better understanding of expectations and commitment to school work. Students are encouraged to meet their AR goals. Studies show that reading 5-10 minutes a day will boost vocabulary, reading skills and achievement scores on standardized tests. Be sure to set aside work time at home so students have a quiet consistent work place at home during the evening hours. Please support students educational growth as it is the stepping stones to their future. This winter we will gain an extra support for students.

In January the K-12 Special Education department welcomes Cooperating Teacher Irma Morales into our classrooms. She will begin student teaching in the area of K-6 Resource for the first 9 weeks and will join Mr. Petersen for the next 9 weeks in the 7-12 program. Sixth Grade Computers

This year the Sixth Grade Computer class is a new curriculum called Slater Farms.

The is an integrated Microsoft Office simulation that has the students complete real-world projects using Microsoft Word, Excel, and Powerpoint. Students have to completed projects based on a fictional farm that sells fruits and vegetables. Students are using the Microsoft Office skills they have learned last year and learning new skills to complete projects such as: Creating a letterhead, employee memos, newsletter, calendar using Microsoft office; creating a schedule, balance sheet, crop chart, and contact lists using Microsoft Excel, and creating a Powerpoint for a tour of the farms and a cooking demonstration. Each of these projects reinforces skills that can be applied to the use of Microsoft Office, Excel, and Powerpoint that the students will use for any of their classes as well as for personal use.

I see this being a very valuable tool for all students at Overton.

It has been an incredibly challenging start but a successful one, and I would like to thank Deb Ditson and Shannon Lauby for their dedication, patience and hard work in helping create quality programming for our stu-

dents with special needs as well as a fun, positive learning environment.

For a less frantic schedule, put school and family first

Are you eating dinner in the car again? Is your child so tired from karate class and soccer practice he can't focus on his homework? Your family may be over-scheduled. It's a common problem. But there are things you can do to ensure you and your child have the time you need for activities and time together. Try these tips:



- Get a big calendar. Block out time for critical things. Your child has to go to school every day. He needs time for homework. These aren't negotiable.
- Talk about the activities that matter most to your family. Is eating dinner together a high priority? What about a family visit to grandparents? Put these on the schedule next.
- Add your child's activities. Include the real time each one takes. Add in the time to drive to and from practice or the game.
- Think about things you don't have time for that you'd like to do. Choose one or two of these and put them on the schedule.
- Don't feel that you need to fill in every minute. Your child needs some downtime where he can do nothing at all. So do you. And you need time together.

If you have to say no to an activity, you may be saying yes to school success and a closer family. That's not a bad trade.

When it comes to discipline, be positive

Preparing your child for academic success involves using appropriate discipline. But discipline is not the same as punishment-it's almost the opposite! One of the most critical parts is encouraging good behavior. Research shows it works to:

- Focus on changing two or three behaviors at a time.
- Provide details of the way you want your child to behave. Saying "When Sarah asks for a turn, please give her one," is better than simply saying "Be nice."
- Model good behavior. Kids learn from watching parents.
- Take one step at a time. If you want your child to read for

20 minutes each night, start with a shorter time and build up.

- Give frequent and specific compliments. "Awesome! You shared the first time Sarah asked!"
- Show enthusiasm. There's a big difference between saying smile and a high five.

Avoid homework headaches

Your child may not love homework, but a homework routine will make it easier for her to settle down to study time. To create one:



- Choose the same time each day. It reduces the need for nagging.
- Include the whole family. Turn off the TV. Read or do quiet chores.
- Keep rescheduling to a minimum. If there is a conflict, be sure your child knows when homework time will be.
- Keep track with an assignment calendar. Ask questions such as "How's the report coming? It's due Friday."

Make reading a happy habit

Before crossing homework off the to-do list each day, remember the importance of daily reading. Kids who read oftenand enjoy it-develop positive attitudes about this important skill. Try to:



- Show enthusiasm. "Hooray! We get to relax and read now!"
- Keep appealing books on hand.

Get psyched for science

Your child is participating in a science fair. You say "Great!" but worry about the workload. To keep it manageable and fun:

- Consider your child's interests. Look for intriguing, educational experiments together at the library or online.
- Be creative. Ask "What if ... ?" and brainstorm about different twists your child might give a popular experiment.
- Supervise. Help your child make a step-by-step plan for completing his project on time. Encourage him while he does the work.

How do I help my defiant child get more organized?

Q: My daughter and I are locked in a power struggle over just about everything. She refuses to pick up after herself, and her room is a disaster. She can't find her homework. She can't get ready on time in the morning. She says, "It's my room. I can do what I want." How do I get her to take responsibility?



A: This battle is about more than just a tidy room. It's time to help your daughter remember that there are boundaries and rules she needs to

follow. While it may be her room, it's your house and you get to set the rules for the family. Motivate your child to take responsibility by using a combination of help and consequences.

To get her started:

- Set a timer and a small goal. By now, tidying the room may seem like an overwhelming task. Set the timer for 15 minutes and offer to help her put away her clothes. The key is to help-not to do the job yourself.
- Establish a positive consequence. Is there something she wants you to do? Perhaps give her a ride to a friend's house? Say you're happy to do it-after the clothes are picked up.
- **Refuse to engage in power struggles.** She knows the rules, and she knows the consequences. When she meets her part of the bargain, you will meet yours.

Does your child read aloud to you?

Reading aloud doesn't have to be a one-way street. Parents who encourage children to read aloud to them help their children become stronger readers. Are you helping your child develop reading fluency? Answer yes or no:

- **1. Do you set aside** at least a little time each day for your child to read aloud?
- **2. Do you try** to make reading time low-stress by having it when you can give your child your undivided attention?
- **3.** Do you avoid jumping in right away if your child mispronounces a word?
- **4. Do you switch** books if there are too many words your child doesn't know?
- 5. Do you talk about the book with your child when

he finishes it? Which parts did vou each like?

How well are you doing?

More yes answers mean you are building your child's reading skills. For each no, try that idea.



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Prepare for test success

You know your child should prepare for tests, but what should you do to help? It's a good idea to:

- **Have your child ask** the teacher what will be covered.
- Supervise several study sessions. Studying works best when it's done over time—not at the last minute.
- **Use resources.** Make flash cards, print out blank maps, or have your child take a practice test.
- Be positive. "You've got this material memorized! You'll do well!" There's no need to pressure your child. Support and preparation are all she needs.

Team up against stress

He used to love school, but now he often says he's too sick to go. His grades are falling. He doesn't spend time with his friends. Your child may be under stress.

Remind him that you are on his side. And if you suspect stress is causing schoolrelated issues for your child, contact his teacher. See if there are things you can do together to work on the problem.

Keep screens in their place

By age nine, many children are media savvy. They are fans of actors, music groups and online games. But too much screen time interferes with study time-and some online

.



- activity can be dangerous. To get control:
- Set and enforce limits. Kids this age should spend no more than two hours per day-total-in front of a screen.
- Be aware of what your child sees.
- **Record TV shows.** Let your child watch them on your schedule, without the ads.

Setting up Apple's Family Share for AppleIDs.

With the introduction of iOS 8 for all iDevices, Apple created a family share setup. Once setup, this allows up to 6 people to have all of their AppleIDs connected to one "Family Organizer". All of the ID's use one credit card or giftcard to make purchases and the "Organizer" can approve or decline the family members purchases. This is a great way for parents to control the apps that their kids put on their devices and allows an app that is purchased by one account to be shared by all other accounts without having to be purchased again.

Setting up Family Sharing is simple. The "Family Organizer" invites up to 5 other AppleIDs to join in their "family". Their account holds the credit card or gift card balance and agrees to special iTunes and Apple ID conditions for payment. Once the invited members accept the invitation, their devices are automatically configured with the new setup. Anything that has been purchased by any member of the "family" is now accessible to every other member by going to Purchased in the App Store.

All new iTunes, iBooks, and App Store purchases initiated by family members will be billed to the organizer's account. But the organizer can still call the shots. Just turn on Ask to Buy for children in the family. When a child initiates a purchase, an alert is sent to the organizer, who can review the download and approve or decline it right from the organizer's device. This applies to both purchases and free downloads.

This is a great way to help combine all the many apps you may purchase over several accounts, and keep you from making multiple purchases of the same app. If you wish to know more about Family Sharing, or need help with the setup process, go to <u>http://www.apple.com/icloud/family-sharing/</u> and find out more.



Three Concepts of Bucket Filling

Each of us has an invisible bucket. It is constantly emptied or filled, depending on what others say or do to us. When our bucket is full, we feel great. When it is empty, we feel awful.

Each of us has an invisible dipper. When we use that dipper to fill other people's buckets by saying or doing things to increase their positive emotions, we also fill our own bucket. But when we use that dipper to dip from others' buckets by saying or doing things that decrease positive emotions, we diminish ourselves.

Be a Bucket Filler

A full bucket gives us a positive outlook and renewed energy. Every drop in that bucket makes us stronger and more optimistic. When you fill someone else's bucket with a smile, hug, kind word, or gesture, you fill your own. The more you fill buckets, the quicker your own bucket fills up. Your bucket can never be too full.

Don't Dip
