***High School Language Arts
with Mrs. Merrigan***

Greetings! We are well into our second semester. We are staying busy, and time is flying by! Here's a little bit about what the different English classes have been and will be working on this semester:

English 9

Grammar parts of speech unit: We reviewed basic parts of speech with the intent that students learn this language to use when we work on improving writing and analyzing others' writing we read.

Non-fiction literature: Students learn elements of literature specific to non-fiction writing, as well as review basic reading skills and literary elements which are necessary and present in all types of writing.

Drama: Freshmen will read Shakespeare's *Romeo & Juliet*. *They always enjoy this classic love drama, as well as get another opportunity to review literary skills and elements as we read the play together.*

English 10

Grammar parts of speech unit: Just as with the freshmen, we review basic parts of speech. For sophomores this is helpful as we begin working more on writing to prepare them for persuasive writing as juniors for district and state assessments. For any students taking Spanish, their parts of speech knowledge helps them in learning a second language.

Night: *We read the memoir novel by Nobel Peace Prize winner Elie Wiesel. This quick, chilling tale gives his personal account of his Holocaust experience. After reading the novel, students have the opportunity to complete individual mini-research projects and presentations on topics related to the book including genocide, liberation camps, and war crime trials.*

Drama: Sophomores will read Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar*. *We review reading skills and literary elements as we read the play together, discussing the drama based on real life history.*

English 11

NeSA Writing: Juniors completed the NeSA writing assessment in January. They have been practicing their persuasive writing skills with me since last year, and I am confident they showed their best skills in their writing samples!

NeSA Reading: Among other assessments, juniors will take the NeSA Reading test during the exam window March 23 - May 1. We prepare for this by reviewing literary elements and practicing reading comprehension and reading test-taking skills.

The Great Gatsby: *Students love this quick classic. After reading, students have the opportunity to research and present information on related topics including the 1919 World Series and the Jazz Age.*

English 12

World Literature (1650-present): Reviewed works and ideas from ages including Enlightenment, Romantic, and Victorian, as well as authors from around Europe including Dickens, Tolstoy, and Wilde.

Senior Research Project: Seniors are beginning their individual research projects. They each have a topic and will write an 8-10 page paper in three sections which include an author, one work they wrote, and the time period during which they wrote it. Students will focus on research and writing skills as they work to complete their projects, which will end with a presentation.

A Snapshot of 3rd Grade

In January, the 3rd Grade students began meeting with the Kindergartners each Friday for Reading Buddies. The students split up into two groups. Some of the 3rd graders go to the Kindergarten room to read, while the others stay in the classroom to work with the Kindergartners on computers. The students enjoy working together and look forward to Reading buddies each week.

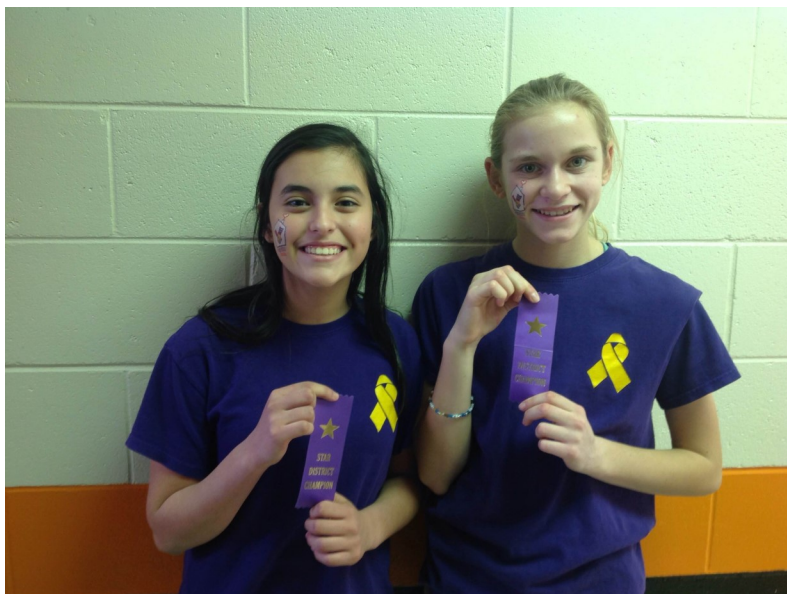


Hailey Harris and Diana Perdomo have been working on a Star FCCLA project. Our project includes a pop tab collection competition for the elementary classes and a selfie challenge. First Grade won with a total of 46.7 pounds. Kindergarten came in with a close second with 46.4 pounds. Our goals are to donate two thousand dollars to the organization and have 175 people take part in the challenge. Through our collection we have collected over two hundred pounds which we are planning to donate to the Ronald McDonald House Charity. We look forward to representing our school and community at State FCCLA in April. FEBRUARY 2015

As you may have heard on the news, Nebraska is experiencing measles cases. Measles is a highly contagious viral illness. It begins with fever, cough, runny nose, conjunctivitis (pink eye) lasting 2-4 days before the onset of a blotchy rash, which is usually from head to toe. Measles can cause severe complications, including pneumonia, encephalitis (swelling of the brain) and death.

Measles is transmitted by contact with an infected person through coughing and sneezing. Those infected are contagious from 4 days before their rash starts through 4 days afterward. After an infected person leaves a location, the virus remains viable for up to 2 hours in the air and on surfaces.

The best line of defense is a two dose vaccination against the disease.

Minimal isolation and control measures set forth by the health department state to exclude the student for the duration of the illness and for no less than 4 days after the onset of the rash. Unimmunized students will be excluded from the date of diagnosis of the first case until 14 days after rash onset of the last known case.

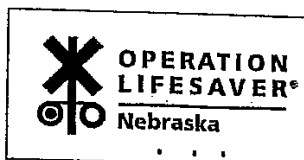
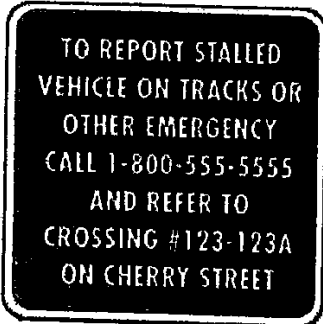
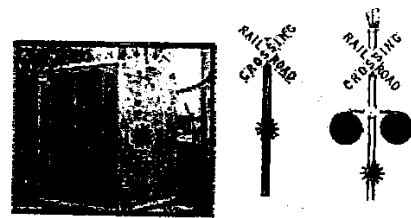
If no train seen immediately:

1. Look for emergency sign on railroad post or building
2. Call 1-800 # on the sign.
3. Give the operator the crossing number on sign. (this is a unique DOT designation for the crossing where you are located at)
4. Stay clear of Vehicle!
