Honor Roll: Congratulations to all of the students who made the Honor Roll and Honorable Mention for 1st Semester. This is great honor and proves that your hard work has paid off. Keep up the good work. We had a record number of students make the Honor Roll this past semester. Thank you to Mr. Hoyt and his classes for making some new boards very quickly. A quick reminder that report cards are available on Powerschool for grades 5-12. These are not mailed home. If you need help accessing these reports, please contact me at school.

New Homework Policy: Many teachers began implementing our new 'No Zero' homework policy at the end of last semester. We saw many positives from this policy and I look forward to seeing the continued success of our students. Here is the wording of the new policy.

Student Academic Success

Academic success or failure is determined by a number of factors. One of the main factors of student failure is homework. Failing to do homework results in two major problems; one, the student does not practice and move toward mastery of a topic; and two, incomplete homework results in a zero in the gradebook. Many students do not realize the devastating effect zeros have on their cumulative grade.

Overton Public School is attempting to eliminate zeros from student grades by making sure all homework is completed and turned in. The teachers have been asked to hold students accountable for all homework. If a student comes to class without homework completed, he or she is to call his or her parent and make arrangements to attend Access Period that afternoon or to come in before school the next morning. Students who ride the bus must stay after school the following day if arrangements cannot be made for that afternoon.

Flexibility is built into the policy to benefit teachers and students. Teachers are allowed to use professional judgment when addressing the needs of the students. Some teachers may find time during the day for the student to come to them and complete the homework rather than having them stay after school. For example, teachers may ask a student to come in during Homeroom, Study Hall, or during their planning period if the student has time in their current class. Teachers must communicate with the other teachers on the last example. If a student completes their homework during the day, they are still required to turn their homework in after school so the teacher can check the paper for accuracy and to ensure the student comprehends the material unless other arrangements have been made between the student and teacher. All late homework will be graded at 80% of the actual grade. If a student does not show up for Access Period, when assigned, the teacher will issue a detention for this action.

By implementing the No-Zero Policy, it is our hope the overall academic success of our students will improve, the depth of learning will increase, and raised achievement and growth will be reflected on our local and state assessments.




Want to get rid of books that your kids used to read?

The Secret Addiction- Self-Harm by Candelaria Bueno and Kamryn Harms

Did you know that Self-harm is not a suicidal act? In fact, people who self-harm do not want to die. It's just a way for them to cope with problems they may be going through. Self-harm is also not a mental health problem.

Not an attention seeker- Family, friends, and doctors think that people who self-harm are just seeking attention, but in reality they do it in a secret manner because they feel ashamed about what they do and are afraid of seeking help.

Ways to help!- It may be difficult to detect someone who self-harms but if you know someone who does, here are a couple of ways you can help someone who self-harms.

- 1. You can ask how they are feeling. Give them some advice and help them cope through the problems they may be going through.
- 2. Do NOT be judgmental. Being judgmental would probably be the worst possible way to help! Please try to be understanding and just listen.
- 3. The most supportive way to help someone who self-harms is, When they talk to you about their problems. Be respectful and compassionate about what the person is telling you even if you find it difficult to accept what they are doing. Give them a listening ear and some space. When they are ready to talk they will.

Life Under Water: The Dark Side of Depression by Jordan Bidwell

Depression is a real and serious illness that affects nearly 2 million teenagers a year. It can lead to other medical issues such as cancers and diseases. Some symptoms of depression include: unexplainable tiredness or aches, a loss of interest in activities, a change in weight or appetite, and many others. If these symptoms last for longer than six months and interfere with your life, then you might have depression. You may know or suspect someone of having depression. To help them, you must first learn that they have it. This has to voluntarily come from them. Do not push them to tell you something that's uncomfortable, because depression can be. Be there for support, comfort, and encouragement. Always listen, even when you don't like or understand what they're saying. Just being there for them is enough to help.

Sibling Rivalry by Hannah Smith

Mirror, mirror on the wall who is mom and dad's favorite after all? Most siblings will experience some type of completion at some point in their lives, this is a natural thing called sibling rivalry. Most of the time younger children fight physically with one another, while older children tend to get into more verbal arguments. Sibling rivalry can even continue into adulthood. Teach them conflict management- don't deny their feelings but rather help them to express them appropriately.
