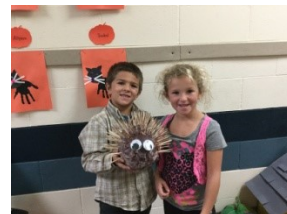

The Nebraska Department of Education Introduces Nebraska Thursdays!

Farm to school efforts are sweeping across the country and taking root in local communities. This is largely in part due to national support provided in 2010 by Congress, establishing mandatory funding for a farm to school competitive grant and technical assistance program through the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act. This year, the Nebraska Department of Education is one of 65 projects spanning 42 states and Puerto Rico receiving funding through the USDA Farm to School Grant Program.

Grant funds will help develop Nebraska Thursdays, a program that brings schools together to serve a Nebraska-sourced meal in the cafeteria on the first Thursday of each month. Nebraska Department of Education Nutrition Services is partnering with the Center for Rural Affairs to roll-out a pilot program in five school districts across Nebraska in the 2017-2018 school year. The five participating districts, Wayne, Litchfield, Thayer Central, Overton and Omaha Public Schools, all bring to the table some experience in sourcing and serving local foods.

Each pilot school kicked off their Nebraska Thursdays program in September or October 2017, also in celebration of National Farm to School Month. A variety of local foods were showcased on each piece of the plate, like roast pork, school greenhouse grown tomatoes, Norfolk melons, and Nebraska milk.

This program will roll out statewide in the fall of 2018. All schools serving meals to Nebraska students will be invited to register for the program. Participating schools will receive access to resources, promotional materials, technical assistance and opportunities to connect with other Nebraska Thursdays schools.

Nebraska Thursdays helps to educate on accessing, using and promoting local foods, creating a pathway for these foods to be available on school menus. Schools will receive resources and materials to take a step forward in purchasing, processing, and promoting local foods in schools.

According to the 2015 U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm to School Census, nationally farm to school programs have invested more than \$789 million in local communities; offered 17,089 salad bars with healthy options to students and staff; and grown 7,101 school gardens. Approximately 1,039 school districts serve local foods during the peak season in the summer months and 1,516 school districts start farm to school early in their pre-K programs. Here in Nebraska, 29% of school districts surveyed said that they participate in farm to school activities. That's 71 districts with 458 schools and 188,637 students.

Nebraska is a state rich in agriculture. Beef, hogs, eggs, dairy products, dry beans and potatoes all rank as top leading agricultural products in the state. School

greenhouses and gardens are growing in numbers, and as they grow, education and nutritional benefits are as diverse as the fruits and vegetables being produced. There are multiple streams for accessing local foods.

There is value in farm to school for the cafeteria, the classroom and the community. Each dollar invested in farm to school stimulates an additional \$.60-\$2.16 of local economic activity. Income increases for individual farmers on average by 5% in sales and establishment of a long-term revenue stream, according to the National Farm to School Network.

The Nebraska Department of Education Nutrition Services is receiving support from the Nebraska Edible Bean Commission, Midwest Dairy Council and the Nebraska Beef Council to undergo this project, as well as Omaha Public School Nutrition Services. Stay tuned for success stories at pilot schools, and in 2018-2019 as the program rolls out statewide!

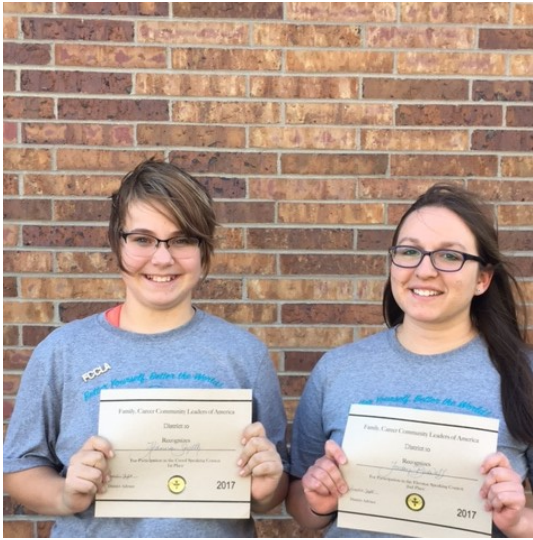

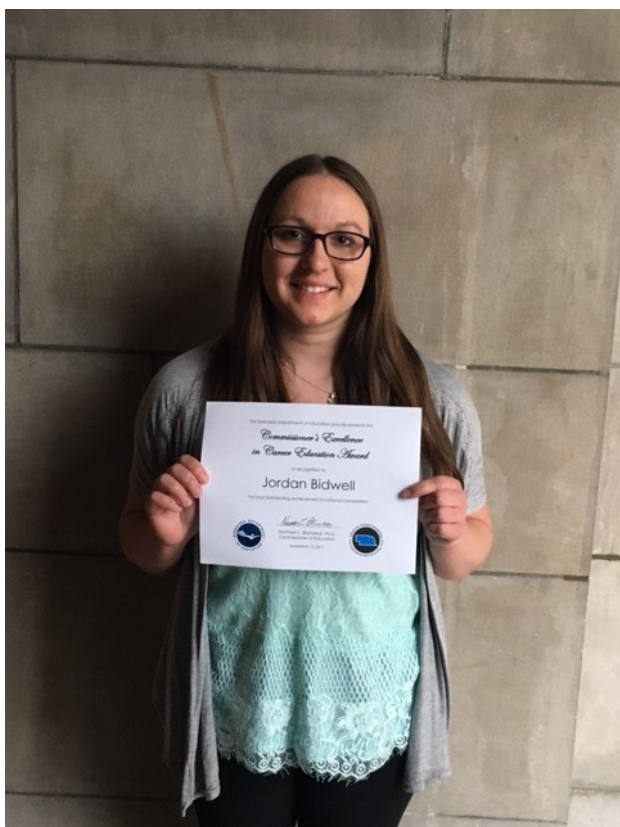


FCCLA

GREETINGS FROM THE BUSINESS DEPARTMENT/FBLA/YEARBOOK:

The business department is off to a great start this year with a good increase in enrollment in Business. Here are some of the things we are learning in the Business Department.

ACCOUNTING 1- Students are working on the basics of putting a business together and learning how to organize and put a framework of accounting principles to run a successful business. Students are learning the procedures while doing automated accounting on the computer. This will take them through most of the year and they will learn how to account for a proprietorship business and partnership business.

BUSINESS MATH/FINANCE-

Students are learning how to do business math in a business while learning how to do consumer math as well. Students are currently working with fractions and have completed the basic adding, subtracting, multiplication as well as division. Students are working on everyday math in business that many businesses use from a range of insurance, paychecks, cooking, groceries and car payments. Students will be finishing the semester with payroll and tax problems.

MANAGEMENT/ENTREPRENEURSHIP-

Students are learning about what kind of philosophies a good leader has and what platform they will use when they begin their leadership style or management style in the real world. Students will not only have a grasp of the philosophy they will use as a leader, they will use their platform to decipher what leadership style they will begin with and how they will learn to use all leadership styles to help them achieve success as a leader. Students will put their management and leadership styles to use as next semester they will learn how to build a business plan and go through a shark tank scenario with the public.

COMPUTER APPLICATIONS-

The seventh grade is in the process of finishing up their first quarter of learning a very important soft skill in the business world and knowing how to type. The seventh grade is learning the keyboard and working on building speed and accuracy. Next Semester, the eighth grade will be in the process of working with the keyboard again and in their second term of learning the keyboard and basic computer applications.

INFORMATION TECH 1 & 2-

The freshmen students are in their third term of finishing the soft skill of learning the keyboard and doing basic computer application skills dealing with Microsoft Office and powerpoint and apple t.v. The students have completed a quarter long project on "How many years will it take them to earn a million dollars in their lifetime." This is an important project because students are basically planning out their college career, working career and family plans for the future and this path taught them how to find a college, purchase a car, rent or buy a house and plan for retirement. We will do projects every quarter and this will lead them into the next semester with computer applications.

MARKETING/BUSINESS COMMUNICATIONS-

Students are currently working on the fast paced life of marketing and how we learn how to advertise and build clientele to build business in our communities. Students are currently working on projects and learning how entrepreneurship applies hand in hand with marketing in a business. Next semester, the students will be learning how business communications is vital in business and they will work on correct formatting for projects and learn how to build resumes, applications and cover letters.

YEARBOOK-

Students are in the process of building a yearbook under the helm of Mr. Gilson. This class is organized like an actual business. The students have to budget for the yearbook and as a class we must balance the budget every year. In the budget of the yearbook, the students must fundraise and sell ads to the public, sell yearbooks to parents and community members and also fundraise to maintain a balanced budget. This is the 3rd year in our business and when Mr. Gilson first started with the yearbook prices were set at 35 dollars for a yearbook with a name on it and 32 without a name. Even though the yearbook in the past was not balancing the budget, Mr. Gilson strategically put in place a budget where we would meet the budget while lowering the yearbook in its origin 3 years ago to 33 dollars with a name and 30 without a name on it. The goal was that if we could balance or have a budget surplus in the yearbook we would lower the yearbook price a dollar each year. We are currently in year 3 of the strategic plan that was set and we have met our goals up to this point. This year we will be selling yearbooks for 31 dollars with a name on it and 28 dollars without a name on it.

The students have performed really well in meeting its budget with making a surplus both years to help lower the yearbook and payback past budget deficits. The yearbook will be creating and maintaining the yearbook towards the end of this semester as well as finishing the yearbook for the second semester. You may purchase a yearbook in Mr. Gilson's room at any time but we will officially begin selling yearbooks starting December 1, in case you would like to purchase a yearbook for your student for Christmas. Thank you for all of your help in supporting the yearbook and also please support the businesses that support the yearbook by looking at the end of the yearbook pages with all of the businesses on them.

FBLA-

Students are in the process of building a website this year that will help advertise events of the FBLA as well as allow people to see what all takes place in the FBLA organization. Throughout the year students fundraise for their trip to Omaha, while hosting a fundraiser for the March of Dimes and Cancer Awareness. The team also began a Career Day at Overton to help build awareness to all the student body of the different careers they may choose when they are planning for their careers. The group also plans a teacher appreciation breakfast to help with FCCLA to show gratitude to teachers for their help in the learning process. Students will go to Omaha in April to attend key seminars as well as take tests in their field of study for building a knowledge of the business field.
