## Design Class Color Experiments

For the past two weeks, Mrs. Ehlers Design Class has been studying color as well as how fabrics are dyed and printing on textiles. The class then got to try their hand at the dying process when they tie dyed tshirts. Students were able to experiment with blending colors to create new ones and learn how the dying process works. The class also learned that while their t-shirts were $100 \%$ cotton and accepted the dye well, the thread used to sew the shirts must contain nylon or polyester because the thread remained white.

## 8-12 MATH

As the second semester has gotten underway, students have been at work learning new concepts and reviewing older ones. We have many concepts yet to explore and learn throughout the remainder of the school year. Seniors in calculus will learn the ins-and-outs of derivatives and integrals. Juniors will be learning trigonometry in great depth as well as preparing for and taking the ACT test. Sophomores will continue learning higher-level concepts within algebra while the 8th-grade algebra students will continue to learn the basics of algebra. Freshmen geometry students will focus on learning and applying all the properties of triangles, quadrilaterals, and other polygons. With the winter math MAP assessments just getting underway this week, students are given the opportunity to "show what they know". The MAP assessments provide a lot of useful information that is analyzed to determine the strengths and weaknesses of each student as well as the strengths and weaknesses of each class. This analysis is beneficial in determining how to best focus instruction to most help students improve their learning of mathematics. Even with the main objective of math classes being to learn math skills and math concepts, we are also working to develop critical thinking skills, responsibility, and perseverance within that process. We will continue to improve our ability in all of these areas and work to make the second semester a very successful one.

## Ag Ed Update

Hello from Mrs. Loudon! We are off to a great start in the agricultural education program. Here are some highlights:

Biotech - We are writing a paper for the Nebraska Youth Institute World Food Prize. This research paper on a country of our choice will highlight the challenges faced by people in that country of accessing safe, quality, and affordable food. We will then present our own ideas on how to best solve that problem. After we finish this paper, we will earn a $\$ 500$ scholarship to the College of Ag at UNL and will be able to present our findings in front of our peers for a chance to win a trip to the Global Youth Institute!


Intro to Ag - This month we are working on a new
project: floriculture! We are learning about the floral industry and the art of flower arranging. We will be creating bud vases just in time for Valentine's Day! We finished our unit on FFA and even learned how to tie a tie! Alex was our class champion in terms of speed.

Wildlife - We are using digital mapping tools to follow the flow of energy and matter in food chains and webs. We are hoping to also learn more about the crane migration and do some population counts with bald eagles along the Platte River.

Middle School - We are working on Soybeans and learning about their role in both animal and human food. We are also starting FFA Fridays so that our students are all eligible to earn their FFA Discovery Degree!

## Library FAQ's

This might be the answer you've been waiting for. Here are some commonly asked questions by students and parents about library policies and Accelerated Reader (AR) at Overton Public School.

Can students take Accelerated Reader (AR) tests over personal books?

- Yes, as long as there is a test over the book, it does NOT have to come from the school library.

How do I know if there is a test? How can I check the level of a book that is my own?

- Go to ARbookfinder.com. You can find book levels, possible points, and quiz numbers. If you can't find it, there isn't a test on the book. There is a place to make requests, so if your book is new, request a test. The more requests they get, the more likely they are to write a test.

What does a book level mean?

- Students in grades 1-8 take the STAR reading test three times per year. This test gives us a range where the student will be most successful. This reading range is a guideline and each student is different. Teachers and library staff encourage students to read within their level. Once they are successful, then books out-of-level can be considered. Books under the reading range/level are not recommended for AR tests because they aren't always challenging. As students get older, reading level is not as much of a concern as finding interesting materials.
- Books in the library are color-coded by level to help students identify levels easily without having to pull the book off the shelf.
- Books in the library are also shelved by interest level. Books in the high school section are not appropriate for young readers because of the content, not the book level. Students often see books in their level, but are not allowed to check them out because of interest/age appropriateness.
- Most books for middle/high school students are written at a 4.5-6.0 level. So students with higher levels are not going to find a lot of books over a 6.5. Branching out and reading different types of books will be a way to challenge themselves, too.

How do I know how my student is doing on AR tests?

- Previously, you had to rely on reports that came home or ask their teacher. Now, we can sign you up to receive emails when your student takes a test. If you are interested in this feature, please contact your child's teacher or Mrs. Lassen to set up email notifications.

Can my student retake an AR test?

- No, once they have taken a test on a book, they can no longer retake it here at Overton. Their account follows them through high school. The exception is first grade, when they first begin taking tests, but this is only for the first few months.

How many books can students check out? Why can't my student get another book?

- Students are allowed to check out 2 library books at time for a 3-week period. Once a book is overdue, they cannot check out a new book until they have returned, renewed, or paid for the overdue/missing book. We do not charge fines for overdue books, but they are unable to get new books. Students in grades $7-12$ receive overdue notices by email at least once per month. Overdue lists are given to teachers monthly in grades K-6 and once a book is several weeks overdue, or a student believes it is missing, we send notes home.
