
3rd Grade- **3rd Grade Class** as a whole because they have been troopers while we go through NSCAS review and they have been great at helping pick up the playground after recess!

Pi Day 2021



RECOMMENDED SLEEP TIMES

Newborns (0-3 Months) 12-18 Hours



- Observe baby's sleep patterns and identify signs of sleepiness
- · Put baby in the crib when drowsy, not asleep
- Place baby to sleep on his/her back with face and head clear of blankets and other soft items
- Encourage nighttime sleep.

Infants (4-11 Months) 12-15 Hours



- Develop regular daytime and bedtime schedules
- Create a consistent and enjoyable bedtime routine
- Establish a regular "sleep friendly" environment
- Encourage baby to fall asleep independently

Toddlers (1-2 Years) 11-14 Hours



- Maintain a daily sleep schedule and consistent bedtime routine
- Make the bedroom environment the same every night and throughout the night
- Set limits that are consistent, communicated and enforced. Encourage use of a security object such as a blanket or stuffed animal



RECOMMENDED SLEEP TIMES

Preschoolers (3-5 Years) 7.

- Maintain a regular and consistent sleep schedule
- Have a relaxing bedtime routine that ends in the room where the child sleeps
- Child should sleep in the same sleeping environment every night, in a room that is cool, quiet and dark – and without a TV

School-aged (6-13 Years) 9-11 Hours

- Teach school-aged children about healthy sleep habits
- Continue to emphasize need for regular and consistent sleep schedule and bedtime routine
- Make child's bedroom conducive to sleep dark, cool and quiet
- Keep TV and computers out of the bedroom
- Avoid caffeine

Younger Adults and Adults (18-64 Years) 7-9 Hours



- · Stick to a schedule, even on weekends
- Practice a relaxing bedtime ritual
- Exercise daily
- Beware of hidden sleep stealers like alcohol and caffeine
- Turn off electronics before bed





4th Grade Students and Parents!

One big key to success in 5th grade is organization! The teachers understand that the students are learning many new things and will help them open lockers, finding the correct books, etc. There are steps you can take as a family to help with organizational skills. First, we encourage 5th graders to invest in a zippered binder. This will allow them to keep notebook paper, writing utensils, and class folders all in one location. Secondly, color-coding classes helps tremendously. For instance, all science materials can be green, so the student will have a green notebook, folder, and stretchy book cover for that class social studies items might all be blue, math-red, etc. Also, buying a locker shelf to help divide the locker into upper and lower sections can assist in keeping supplies more easily accessible. Something I would suggest purchasing early is a locker shelf.

On the first day of school, all 5th graders will receive a planner. Please participate in this organizational and communication tool, and encourage and help your child to use this tool. The expectation is that he/she write their class assignments in the planner and bring the planner home each day so you, as a parent, can see what assignments have been given. Students should be taking their planner with them to each class, as they also contain passes to the library, bathroom, etc.
