

Día de los Muertos

There has been a lot of activity in the Spanish classes throughout the school so far this year. At the end of October, students learned about the Mexican cultural tradition of the Day of the Dead (Día de los Muertos). They were able to make connections between the Mexican holiday and our well known American holiday of Memorial Day, as both are centered around the remembrance of loved ones who have died. For the culmination of this unit of study, students go to make, decorate, and eat their own sugar skulls (calaveras de azúcar). Sugar skulls are common decorations and treats of Día de los Muertos, and they symbolize the sweetness of life.







La Copa Mundial 2022

For the past month, students in Spanish in grades 5-8 as well as high school students in Spanish 1, 2, and 3 have been exposed to the most popular sport in Spanish-speaking countries - fútbol! With the World Cup (Copa Mundial) being played in November and December as opposed to its usual summer time slot every 4 years, this was the perfect time to incorporate a bit of knowledge about the tournament itself, sports vocabulary, geography and country names, and notable athletes - all in Spanish! Students had the opportunity to predict the winners as they filled out their own World Cup brackets. We even got to watch bits of a few games complete with Spanish commentary. They have all perfected the celebratory cheer "Gooooooooool!"

Elementary Spanish

Elementary Spanish continues to be successful at Overton Public School. With each year that Spanish continues as an offering at our school, students are building a strong foundation for Spanish language acquisition. The fourth graders just finished their semester-long Spanish rotation. As they have advanced, they proved that they were able to add reading and writing in Spanish in their

acquisition process. They were introduced to many words that are cognates in Spanish and English and were able to make connections between their 1st language and another world language.



Las Uvas de Suerte


A tradition that originated in Spain and is celebrated in many Spanish speaking countries is the "12 Uvas de Suerte" or 12 Grapes of Luck. At the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve, together with their families, people eat one grape for each of the twelve strokes of the clock. It is said, that eating the grapes as the clock chimes will bring luck for each month of the year.

• Ask your child if he/she can name the months of the year in Spanish. Most are very similar to the months in English: enero, febrero, marzo, abril, mayo, junio, julio, agosto, septiembre, octubre, noviembre, diciembre (months are not capitalized in Spanish).

Share this tradition with your family. (You might want to cut the grapes in half for children).

• If each family member will need 12 grapes (or 12 halves), how many grapes will you need for your family? Can your child count that high in Spanish?

At 12 o'clock people shout "!Feliz Año Nuevo!" to wish their family and friends happiness in the New Year.







Family & Consumer Sciences News

FOODS CLASS

In Foods, the students are learning about the science behind baking, leavening agents, proper temperature and crystallization. Students made quick breads including muffins and loaf breads. Then they learned about how yeast works by making cinnamon rolls. They learned that the liquid must be the proper temperature for the yeast to activate and you must knead the dough enough to disperse the yeast and develop the gluten.

Finally, they have been demonstrating the importance of temperature and crystallization to make glass candy, toffee and truffles. Sugar cookies will round out the semester and we are all looking forward to starting with cakes in the new year.







LUNG CANCER AWARNESS AND PREVENTION

For part of her STAR project, Peyton Eby has been educating the 7th and 8th graders about the dangers of lung cancer. She shared that most lung cancers are caused by smoking or the use of tobacco & nicotine products. This means that many cases of lung cancer are preventable if people don't smoke or use nicotine products and avoid second-hand smoke. She encouraged them to say no to those who offer them these products and explained how they can help those around them to stop using these products as well.





Does your family struggle to pay your/their school lunch bill?






FFA Update - November Edition
