


FFA Updates

7-12 Science

As the second semester is underway, there is a lot happening in the science room and lab. The seventh grade science class has been learning about plate tectonics and earthquakes. They are now finishing a lab where they are trying to build an earthquake proof building. In Chemistry, we are talking about chemical reactions as well as labs based on chemical reactions. The sophomores are learning about natural selection and ways in which humans can change an organism's ability to survive in an environment. The juniors just finished learning about bacterial transformation in which they were able to insert a gene into a bacterium that caused it to glow under UV light. Anatomy is talking about the different body systems and dissections that go along with each body system. Plant science has been working extremely hard to begin planting flowers and vegetables for the upcoming spring season. We will begin our plant sales on April 12 (weather permitting). It has been a very busy first few weeks of the second semester and we look forward to continuing learning both in the classroom and through the lab and greenhouse.

High School Language Arts

English 9 - The Freshman English class just finished reading Romeo and Juliet. Students read the play, watched a film adaption, and wrote argumentative essays over who was most to blame for the tragedy. We have now moved to reading Elie Wiesel's memoir Night. Students will read the book, write research papers over prisoner of war camps, and take a field trip to the POW exhibit at the Nebraska Prairie Museum.

English 10 - The Sophomore English class spent time last semester reading and analyzing short stories and poetry. They are currently reading *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. Students have researched the Russian Revolution and will make connections between Orwell's characters and the issues with Communism. As part of this unit, the sophomores will create windmills to connect ELA with Science.

English 11 - The Junior English class is preparing for the statewide ACT test. Students have been reviewing grammar concepts, practicing writing, and completing readings as practice for the test. In addition, they just started a unit over The Crucible, studying both the Salem Witch Trials and the Red Scare of the 1950s. Students will soon begin writing a research paper.

English 12 - The Senior English class just finished writing rough drafts of their research papers. They are currently completing a job unit where they are getting practice writing resumes, interviewing for jobs, and making professional phone calls and emails. Before graduation, students will edit their research papers and create a presentation to share their research. They will answer audience questions and provide a solution for the problem they discussed in their papers.

COACHING YOUR CHILD THROUGH FRIENDSHIP DRAMA







TRY TO FIX THE PROBLEM FOR THEM.

- "You need to stay away from them for a while."
- "I'm going to call their parents right now!"

FORCE YOUR CHILD TO STAY WITH OR CHANGE FRIENDS.

- "You are not allowed to play with them anymore!"
- "You have been friends since 1st grade. You need to keep your friendship."

ASSUME YOUR CHILD IS ALWAYS THE VICTIM.

- "You're always getting picked on."
- "You poor thing. You can't stand up for yourself because you're smaller."

MINIMIZE HURTFUL COMMENTS.

- "I'm sure you two will be fine by tomorrow. You always make up."
- "Let it go. I'm sure they didn't mean it."

BAD TALK THE FRIEND

- "I never liked you being friends with them!"
- "They have anger management issues they need to work out."

LISTEN TO YOUR CHILD WITHOUT JUDGMENT AND GIVE YOUR FULL ATTENTION.

- "What happened?"
- "What do you think the problem is?"

ASK OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS TO LEARN MORE ABOUT THE SITUATION.

- ♦ "How did you feel when they said that?"
- "What bothered you the most about that situation?"

SHOW EMPATHY.

- "That must have felt really hurtful when they called you that."
- "It must have been very hard to stay in class after that happened."

ASK WHAT KIND OF HELP THEY NEED FROM YOU.

- ↑ "How can I support you right now?"
- ♦ "What do you need?"
- "I'm always here if you need my help."

BRAINSTORM TOGETHER.

- "What are some options that you would be comfortable trying to deal with this?"
- Thow do you think they would react if you tried doing that?"

Talk regularly about friendships. Use audio stories, books, social media, and your personal experiences as conversation starters to point out what good and healthy friendships do and do not look like.

DRY BEANS



Nebraska Harvest of the Month celebrates dry beans this month! Pinto, Black and Great Northern beans are just a few versatile varieties grown in our state. School Nutrition Staff at your school will be preparing recipes featuring locally grown beans.

SELECTION, STORAGE & COOKING

- Dry beans are allowed to mature and then harvested from the vine or bush.
 Dry beans come in many colors, shapes and sizes and can be stored for months in a cool dry location.
- Dry beans are soaked to absorb water and will become double to triple their size when soaked. Cook to make them edible and digestible.
- Dry beans can be eaten raw, sprouted or cooked, ground into flour, curdled into tofu, fermented into soy sauce, tempeh and miso. They are excellent in chili, soup and salad.

HUMMUS

Ingredients:

- ½ cup olive oil
- 3-4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 1 cup dry Great Northern beans, prepared and cooked or two
 15.8-oz. cans, drained and rinsed
- 1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
- 1 tsp. ground cumin
- 2 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley
- ½ Tbsp. salt and pinch of pepper

Directions:

- 1. In a small saucepan, combine olive oil and garlic over mediumlow heat and lightly brown garlic. Cool, strain and reserve the oil and garlic separately.
- 2. In a blender, blend beans, garlic, lemon juice, cumin and parsley until smooth. Carefully pour in oil with blender running until light and smooth.
- 3. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve with raw veggies or pita chips, or add to a sandwich! Enjoy!

FUN WITH DRY BEANS

LET'S GROW BEANS!

Materials Needed:

- Dry Kidney or Great Northern beans, soaked overnight
- · Water spray bottle
- Paper towels
- · Glass cup



Directions-

- 1. Line a glass jar with a paper towel. Tuck your bean between the glass and the paper towel.
- 2. Squirt the paper with plenty of water so the paper is wet but not swimming. Too much water could cause mold on the bean.
- 3. Place one glass and bean in a sunny spot and wait for it to sprout! It should take 2-7 days to sprout. You can also experiment by placing another glass in a dark place, with the bean and paper towel prepared the same way.
- 4. Once the beans have grown in the glass for 3-4 weeks, you can plant outdoors or in a pot with soil.


